**Wes Moore** is one of few coaches who can boast about his winning legacy and repertoire of successes. Coach Moore has the reputation of being a top coach in the Southern Conference, and one of the nation's best.

Moore has a bachelor of science degree in Religion from Johnson Bible College, and both bachelors and masters degrees in Physical Education from the University of Tennessee. As a point guard at Johnson Bible College, Moore helped his team to one conference championship and a sixth-place finish at the National Christian College Athletic Association (NCCAA) National Tournament. During his playing career, he earned all-conference and all-tournament honors.

Prior to UTC, Moore was the men's assistant coach at Johnson Bible College in Knoxville. Moore took the Francis Marion Patriots to their first-ever NCAA Division II national tournament, with appearances over three seasons, from 1984 to 1987. For six years he was head coach at Maryville College, winning 78 percent of his games (131-36) and taking the Lady Scots to five NCAA Division III national tournaments, including the Division III Sweet 16. He also served as women's basketball assistant coach at North Carolina State for two seasons, helping to lead them to the Sweet 16.

He is ranked eighth by the NCAA in winning percentage at .780, with a 390-110 overall record. He became the first Southern Conference coach to reach the 100-win plateau, and currently holds a 127-21 record in league play. In addition, he is the only women's head coach in NCAA history to take multiple teams to the national tournament at all three NCAA levels. Moore is the record holder for most wins as coach in Chattanooga history.

Moore was named the 2004 Southern Conference Coach of the Year, and the 2004 Tennessee Sports Writers Association Collegiate Coach of the Year over Tennessee's Pat Summitt and Vanderbilt's Melanie Balcomb. He often dedicates himself as motivational and instructional speaker at various coaching clinics, banquets and basketball camps, and in previous years was the director of North Carolina State's Kay Yow Basketball Camp.
